# TOTAL THEATRE AWARDS CELEBRATES TEN YEARS AT THE EDINBURGH FESTIVAL FRINGE

It's August, it's Edinburgh – so once again it's time for the Total Theatre Awards!

The Total Theatre Awards at Edinburgh Festival Fringe were founded in 1997 to reach the parts that other theatre awards were missing. We resist too narrow a definition of the term 'total theatre' but examples of previous Awardwinners have included artists and companies working within physical and devised theatre, live art, visual performance, mime, clown, circus arts, street arts, new variety, dance-theatre and puppet-theatre. Total Theatre Awards honour those who demonstrate the power of theatre to communicate, entertain and inspire audiences — a performer-centred rather than writer-dominated theatre that uses any ways or means it wants to achieve that end.

The Total Theatre Awards have grown steadily over the past ten years. Judged by a strong panel of respected critics, producers, programmers and artists, the Awards are prized by the creative community and have an ongoing presence in the national press throughout the year.

For 2007, we celebrate ten years at the Fringe with two new initiatives, the Wildcard vote for audiences and the Giving Something Back free programme for artists. Find out more about both of these inside, together with details on this year's assessing and judging process, and a list of our eminent panel of judges.

Turn the page also for more about what the past year has brought for last year's winners; for our editor's reflection on what's on offer at Fringe 2007; and for updates from some of the artists and companies who are members of Total Theatre, the national agency for contemporary theatre — dedicated to developing theatremakers and audiences.

The Total Theatre Awards 2007 promise to be the best yet — so whether you are a participating artist in this year's Fringe, a producer or presenter, a venue manager or theatregoer, we look forward to crossing paths with you somewhere this August. Have a good festival!

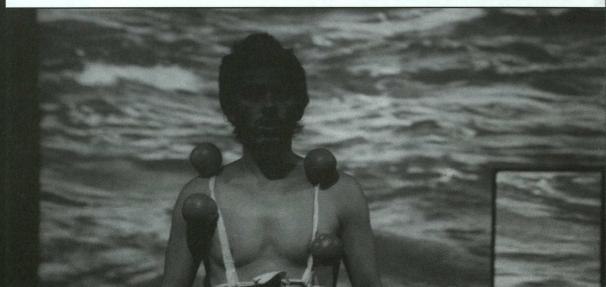

# ONE YEAR ON

HOW WAS IT FOR YOU DARLINGS? OUR 2006 TOTAL THEATRE AWARD WINNERS LET US KNOW WHAT THE PAST YEAR HAS DELIVERED

You come to Edinburgh, you do a show, you spend a lot of money — and if you are lucky, the payback is an audience for your work, critical acclaim, maybe even a Total Theatre Award! But then what?

Total Theatre asked last year's winners how it was for them, post-Fringe 2006...

Inspector Sands and Stamping Ground Theatre found success at the Awards 2006 with *Hysteria*, which has been out and about a fair bit since then.

'We've just come back from a tour of Hysteria which took us to everywhere beginning with B - BAC, Bucharest, Bristol, Brighton and Berlin. And Durham – but that was an exception,' says company director and performer Lucinka Eisler.

One highlight for the company was performing at the London International Mime Festival in January 2007. As to the future, *Hysteria* will be back in Edinburgh (Ballroom at Assembly Rooms 22–27 August), followed by a two-month UK tour in the autumn. They've also begun development work at the Lyric Hammersmith for a new show, *Is That All There Is* (working title), inspired by the Peggy Lee song of the same name. 'So far there has been a lot of wig action,' says Lucinka.

But what does she think about the Fringe? Is it all worth it? 'I still think Edinburgh is the best platform for new work in this country - maybe it's become a bit of a baggy monster and the financial risks for small companies are always there, but it's precious to have such a big meeting of people who believe theatre has an important role to play, and who know that small companies are a crucial part of the culture food-chain!'

Lucinka also flags up the value that the Awards have to artists: 'Some of the work that has won Total Theatre Awards over the years has been the work we've been most inspired by, so it means a lot to be part of that list.'

A connecting thread for the Awards 2006 was the influence of BAC, the London venue where so much interesting contemporary theatre has been developed - acknowledged in its winning a Total Theatre Award for Significant Contribution in 2006. Hysteria was helped along the way by BAC (they also acknowledge support from the Nightingale and Aurora Nova). Another show with BAC connections is The Receipt, a highly unusual piece of theatre combining the talents of comedian Will Adamsdale and musician Chris Branch. Their producer Kate McGrath (of Fuel) says: 'Winning a Total Theatre Award for Innovation was

fantastic recognition for all the team's hard work over 18 months.'

The past-year's activities for *The Receipt* have included an appearance at the Melbourne Comedy Festival, and four weeks in New York. Will Adamsdale is back in Edinburgh this year with a new comedy show, *The Human Computer*, at the Traverse.

One of the highlights at Total Theatre Awards 2006 was seeing the delighted confusion on the faces of young company Chotto Ookii as they took to the stage.

'Winning the Total Theatre Award for Best Newcomer kind of blew us all out of the water — I remember being reduced to a mass of giggles and just wandering around Edinburgh in a beautiful daze' says Jake England-Johns of Chotto Ookii on the success of their first ever show, And Even My Goldfish.

'It was everything that we could have hoped for to reassure us that it was worth continuing' he says. 'Suddenly theatres were a little more interested in our work and we got Arts Council funding for the research and development of the new show.'

This development time led to a strong relationship with Bradford Theatre in the Mill who are supporting the making of new show *Thus Far and No Further*, which Jake describes as 'a madcap explosion of wax, fluff and flour with small animal clowns set to the backdrop of industrial decline.'

Other highlights have included a second tour of And Even My Goldfish that ended with 'the utterly marvellous Arena Festival in Erlangen, Germany. Because of Total Theatre we are now international artists, so my mum is proud!'

So will we see them back at Edinburgh in 2007? Sadly not, says Jake: We so desperately wish we could be back, but alas the old gripe about how a fringe festival has become so cripplingly expensive arises – we are still paying off some of last year's debt!'

Someone who is back this August is Hoipolloi.

'It's been a tremendously exciting time at Hoipolloi since last year's Fringe' says company manager Simon Bedford. 'Audience and critical reaction to Floating was fantastic and the company was proud to receive a Total Theatre Award.'

They've subsequently taken Floating to venues across the UK, and in March 2007 enjoyed five sold out performances in New York as part of the Welsh Assembly government's annual St David's Day celebrations in the city. A successful run as part of bite07 at the Barbican, London has recently ended. With the support of the New Wolsey Theatre, Ipswich, Hoipolloi has also been able to commission Story of a Rabbit, which will receive its premiere at the Edinburgh Fringe '07. And Floating will be returning to the Fringe for eight performances only, as part of the British Council Edinburgh Showcase.

So how have they managed to get back with two shows?

'None of this would have been possible without the support of Arts Council England, East and their Escalator East to Edinburgh scheme which was vital,' says Simon. Later this year, Floating will tour to Oxford, Newcastle, Salford, Leeds and Cambridge.

Another Escalator supported company is NIE (New International Encounter), whose artistic director is Alex Byrne.

'Winning the Award was great for us,' says Alex. 'We often work outside the UK so to get some recognition here was just wonderful.'

Past Half Remembered was the company's second show. It was created in the summer of 2002 in a small Czech

village where NIE lived and worked for the summer, and is the middle part of a trilogy based on contemporary European narratives. After Edinburgh 2006, the show toured the UK and Scandinavia, and then the trilogy was performed at BAC in London. There's a one-day-only opportunity to see all three shows on 20 August at Pleasance Courtyard, where the company is presenting the third part of the trilogy *The End of Everything Ever* throughout August.

NIE have also been working on a new show, My Life With the Dogs, which they are planning to tour in 2008. There's also a new show to be developed at the Lyric Studio in Hammersmith, a three-week New York run for Past Half Remembered and a new improvised project to be developed with BAC.

As with Hoipolloi, NIE point out that the support from Escalator was crucial for getting them to the Fringe: 'The financial risk of a four-week run in Edinburgh is huge for a small company, so Escalator helped us to take this risk' says Alex.

He also flags up the value of the Awards. 'It was very gratifying to be part of the Total Theatre Awards, to feel that we are part of a national scene. Clearly Total Theatre has a huge role to play for this scene.'

One odd feature of the 2006 Awards was something that we only realised afterwards and have since dubbed The Czech Effect: three of six shows that won Awards had a strong connection with the Czech Republic: Anglo-Czech company NIE; *Hysteria* director Lucinka Eisler is a Czech emigree; and *Sclavi* by Farm in the Cave who live and work in Prague. Company producer MJ has this to say about *Sclavi* post-Fringe:

'Thanks to the Total Theatre Award, Sclavi has travelled Europe this past year and is coming back to the UK for a month-long national tour organised by Aurora Nova.'

That tour includes dates in October in Stirling, Glasgow, Liverpool, Aberystwyth, Belfast and dates in November in the South West region. There are also plans for US dates in spring 2008.

So as we can see, there is life after Edinburgh, particularly for Total Theatre Award winners. We'll leave the last word to Alex of NIE:

'I think it's right to come back to what I said at the Awards ceremony last year: we went to Edinburgh in 2004 and didn't know anyone, no one knew us either. Then in 2006 it felt as though we were among friends, that our work was wanted and valued, so, really, thanks for

Around 300 shows are nominated for Total Theatre Awards. Two of our team of 30-plus reviewers and assessors see each show. A shortlist of shows considered for Total Theatre Awards will be posted on our website 16 August.

Between 16 and 22 August, our eminent judging panel then sees these shows, and meets on the evening of 22 August to pick the winners in each category. Our judges for 2007 are: Christie Anthoney, director Adelaide Fringe; Pippa Bailey, creative director Total Theatre (chair of judges); Mary Brennan, dance/live art critic for The Herald; Richard Cuming, programme director performing arts, University of Winchester: Robert Daniels, senior lecturer, University of Chichester; Lyn Gardner, theatre critic for the Guardian; Donald Hutera, writer on dance and performance for The Times/Time Out; Professor Anthony Dean, Dean of Faculty, University of Winchester (representing the Total Theatre board); Ben Harrison, artistic director of Grid Iron Theatre; Kate McGrath, producer for Fuel; Dorothy Max Prior, editor of Total Theatre Magazine; Dominic Rai, director Man Mela Theatre; Beccy Smith, freelance writer and dramaturg; Martin Sutherland, director of The Corn Exchange and New Greenham Arts, Newbury: Nick Wood, course leader MA Advanced Theatre Practice, Central School of Speech and Drama.

Sponsored by University of Winchester For work presented by a young company, in the first four years of their development.

### TOTAL THEATRE AWARD FOR A SIGNIFICANT CONTRIBUTION

For an established individual or company that has helped change the cultural landscape through their work. This could also apply to people working in the sector in other ways such as a venue programmer, producer, journalist, etc.

#### TOTAL THEATRE AWARD FOR BEST ORIGINAL WORK BY A COLLECTIVE/ENSEMBLE

Sponsored by the University of Chichester – MA Theatre Collectives
For original work presented by a group where a collective/ensemble and/or collaborative process is clearly evident in the show. This Award recognises the importance of collaboration in the creation of new work.

### TOTAL THEATRE AWARD FOR EXPERIMENTATION

For work that is pushing the boundaries of form. The winning work recognises the importance of experimentation to explore new ideas and find new models.

### TOTAL THEATRE AWARD FOR BEST PHYSICAL PERFORMANCE

For work demonstrating excellent use and application of physical skill, be it dance-theatre, mime/physical theatre, circus arts, clown, or physical comedy.

### TOTAL THEATRE AWARD FOR BEST SMALL SCALE WORK

For work that is by a solo performer or a two/three hander.

o here it is, the Fringe brochure, all 290 pages it, and where to start? Dip in and out, panic bit that you'll miss something really obvious, o to the sections that are most likely to have nings that interest you, then eventually knuckle own and read the whole thing!

So how to make sense of it all? In these ays of cross-artform fertilisation, there's nteresting stuff all over the place - and not ecessarily where you'd expect to find it. In the ance & Physical Theatre section, for example, ou'll find listings of category-defying work uch as Ray Lee's *Siren* (Aurora Nova @ Drill all) - a spectacle of mechanical movement, ound and light; Blind Summit's delightfully ecadent puppet-cabaret Low Life, and avan Theatre's The Voice of Things - Toilet Paper (at Underbelly), a solo 'object theatre' erformance with live percussion that I have hunch should be interesting. But you'll also nd plenty of dance-theatre and physical neatre, such as the new show Druthers by nterprising young company Precarious, and rodigal Theatre's Queen of the Slaughter. I aw this latter previewed during the Brighton estival. On this first public outing, there was vidence of an extraordinary piece of theatre the making. All the elements are there - a ound core idea, visual beauty, extraordinary hysical performances, soul-enriching song, tremendous understanding of stage setting nd the integration of inspired design with the erformance work. I look forward to seeing the ully realised show!

The Theatre section is daunting: but read a with care and you'll eek out plenty enough to challenge presumptions about 'theatre'. There are, for example, numerous interesting one-terson shows by live art/experimental theatre practitioners including Curious, whose (Be) conging is a beautiful pairing of autobiographical bieces by Leslie Hill and Helen Paris, and Richard Dedomenici's Superjumbo, a 'lo-fi



audio-visual spectacle' that features Richard in a cockpit musing on life, the universe and global travel. I've also seen and greatly enjoyed Bob Karper's Big in Japan (or Three Steves and a Bob), a visual, verbal, and musical reflection on Karper's time spent as a teacher in Japan, which manages to tie together all sorts of interesting strands on cultural identity, childhood friendships and memory. And talking of solo shows, there's one I haven't yet seen that's high on my list, and that is Chris Goode's Hippo World Guest Book (at Pleasance Dome), one of an ongoing series that 'rescue marginal and outsider texts' - in this case, raiding the real ramblings by visitors to a bona fide 'hippophile' website. Chris is a man of many talents, and Hippo World is one of two shows he's presenting at this year's Fringe, the other being the 'subtle and luminous' Longwave, by Signal to Noise, which describes itself as a bleak, wordless comedy.

If dark comedy is your cup of tea, try Unpacked's Funeral Games (Pleasance Courtyard), a two-hander with superb performances from both actors. Unpacked are a young theatre company going from strength to strength - just three years in existence, and this is the third show they've taken to Edinburgh! I haven't seen 40 Feathered Winks by The Paper Birds (a physical/visual theatre ensemble who feature live music), but I loved their first show, and so look forward to this exploration of the third of our lives spent in bed... One I have seen is The Bitches' Ball, the debut show from Penny Dreadful, a company that takes lesser-known historical characters as a source for devised theatre-making. Inspired by commedia dell'arte, the show features a sharp script, strong physical ensemble work, and hearty clowning.

And if you're interested in theatre clown/ physical comedy, don't forget to check out the Comedy section, where many physical theatre artists prefer to get listed. This year, look out

for mad fool Jonathan Kay;
Japanese street artists
extraordinaire Gamarjobat

Under Children's Shows you'll find French puppeteers Theatre du Risorius, with the weird-but-wonderful Volpino, which I saw performed in their Tardis-like travelling truck. I particularly remember some rather wonderful

chicken puppets on bungee wires bouncing around the audience's heads... And continuing the trawl through the brochure, even the Music section throws up some intriguing-looking pieces – how about *Meow Meow in Beyond Glamour: The Absinth Tour* at The Spiegel Garden, apparently 'kamikaze kabaret, opera brut, exotica performance art and karaoke splendour'.

If reading through the brochure gets too tiresome, one way into finding the sort of things you might want to see is latching on to one of the curated programmes within the Fringe. Now, there are some people who feel that this is all against the spirit of the thing: the free-for-all where the best shows somehow magicaly rise to the top, but given the expense and the effort of taking a show to Edinburgh, there's no reason that I can see why artists and companies shouldn't take advantage of the publicity and support of being part of a programme. Particularly when that programme gives sound practical help, as does the Escalator East to Edinburgh scheme pioneered by Arts Council England, East. A stamp of approval from ACE might not guarantee that you'll like the show, but it does suggest that this is work of a certain quality. This year's Escalator programme encompasses 18 performing arts companies, from children's theatre group Theatre of Widdishins to performance poet Luke Wright, with many strong theatre companies, including the Total Theatre Award winners NIE and Hoipolloi. One to look out for is the Nimble Fish production The Container, where the audience shares the confines of a container with illegal immigrants travelling to the UK.

Another curated programme, one that has changed the landscape of the Fringe, is Aurora Nova, now in its seventh year at St Stephen's, set up by Wolfgang Hoffman in collaboration with Komedia Theatre, but now supported by Assembly Festival. Wolfgang feels that this year's programme of physical/visual world theatre is his strongest yet - and it is certainly an impressive line-up. Total Theatre Award winner Andrew Dawson returns with the world premiere of Leitmotif and another Award winner, BlackSkyWhite, is back with Astronomy for Insects; Russia's Do Theatre (who with Wolfgang Hoffman's company Fabrik created the wonderful Hopeless Games) present Hangman; Poland's finest, Song of the Goat, return with Lacrimosa - and there's plenty more from across the world, with the UK represented by the aforementioned Prodigal Theatre's Queen of the Slaughter and by Rotozaza, who continue to challenge expectations of 'theatre' with Etiquette, a half-hour experience for two people in a café.

And if we are talking of curated programmes that help to ease you into the great melee that is the Fringe, note that this is a British Council Edinburgh Showcase year, which means the final week will feature an intensive round of shows (open to the public as well as to delegates) presented by established British theatre makers. Many of the shows mentioned in this round-up are also part of the British Council showcase (for example Curious, Rotozaza, Signal to Noise). The line-up this year also includes Gecko (who won a Total Theatre Award in 2005 with The Race) with new show The Arab and The Jew, writer-performer extraordinaire Tim Crouch with England; Stan's Cafe's The Cleansing of Constance Brown (a show about power, performed in a long and narrow constructed corridor); a deconstruction of Twelfth Night by BAC-supported Filter; Sheffield's finest Third Angel with Presumption; and Bristol-based cross-artform experimenters Uninvited Guests with It Is Like It Ought To Be:

One last hot tip: a late entry to the Fringe and therefore not in the brochure, is the wonderful Eddie Ladd, who won a Total Theatre Award in 2003 with Club Lux. She returns with Cof y Corff/Muscle Memory, described as 'an essay on foot' in which Ladd tries to re-connect with significant moments in Welsh history. She's a solo performer who works in collaboration with a musician and film-maker to create an extraordinary mix of live and digital sounds and images — somehow reaching to the heart, mind and soul all at the same time. This'll be one that I won't be missing!

Hopefully this Cook's Tour of contemporary theatre and performance on offer at Fringe 2007 has been some help — but there's plenty more out there, and we are also relying on you to tell us what to look out for! 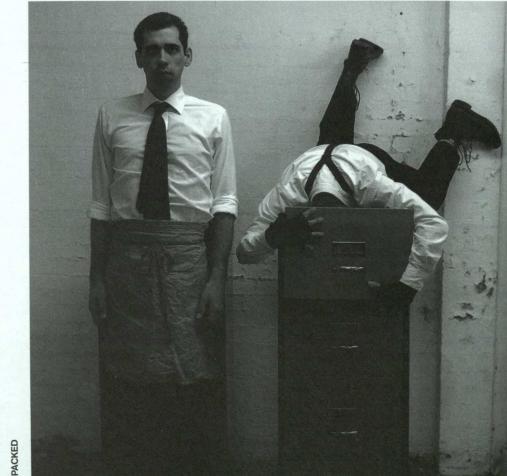
